



## **QUARTERLY PROGRESS REPORT**

Cambodia: Greater Mekong Sub-region Flood and Drought Risk Management and Mitigation Project

Project No.: 40190, Loan and Grant No: L2970-SF, G0330-SCF, L8262-SCF

April – June 2016

#### 1. Introduction

This is the Second Quarterly Progress Report (April – June) of 2016 of the Cambodia: GMS Flood and Drought Risk Management and Mitigation Project, funded by the Asian Development Bank (ADB) and the Government of Cambodia.

## 2. Project Outputs

The Project has four Outputs that are presented below:

- a. Enhanced regional data, information and knowledge base for the management of floods and droughts: Under this component, three specific sub-outputs will be delivered (i) Development of design criteria for flood and drought risk schemes and water control infrastructure in the Mekong Delta, (ii) Assessment of cross-border flood management options in Viet Nam and Cambodia; and (ii) Strengthening of National Flood Forecasting Center in Cambodia:
- b. Upgraded Water Management Infrastructures: Under this component, Damnak Chheukrom Irrigation Systems Rehabilitation in Pursat Province will be implemented which will upgrade irrigation and drainage in 16,100 ha of land and provide increased flood protection for 10,000 people.
- c. Enhanced Capacity for Community-Based Disaster Management: Under this component, at least 5 communities have disaster risk management plans; at least 200 women are trained on CBDRM and at least 30% of CBDRM committee members are female; and farmer managed water user committees are established in Damnak Chheukrom Irrigation System.
- d. Effective Project Implementation: project implementation is completed within 6 years (Sep 2019) and all accounts are closed within 6.5 years (March 2020).

#### 3. Project Area

The Project area comprises selected sub-basins in Cambodia while the upgraded water management infrastructure, the Damnak Chheukrom Irrigation Scheme (DCIS), will be implemented in Pursat province.

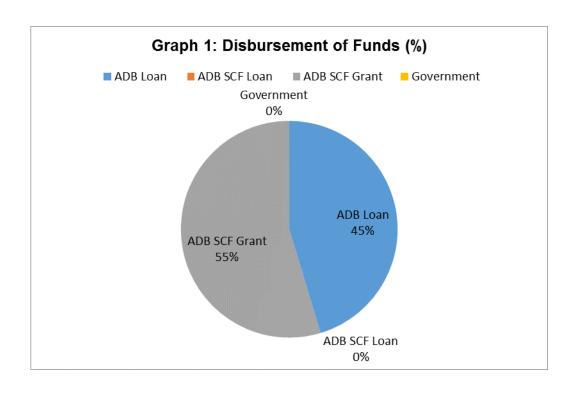

## 9. Safeguards

The project is categorized as "B" for Environment, "A" for Involuntary Resettlement, and "C" of indigenous Peoples.

An Initial Environmental Examination (IEE) was conducted during the feasibility study at the PPTA stage for Damnak Chheukrom Irrigation Scheme (DCIS) in accordance with ADB SPS (2009) and the Government's environmental regulations. Draft Environmental Management Plan (EMP) for the New Barrage on the Pursat River is now prepared.

The Land Acquisition and Resettlement Plan was prepared in 2011 during the PPTA stage and updated by MOWRAM in 2012. The Plan has been agreed between the government and ADB. Updating of RP requires Detailed Measurement Survey (DMS) and updated social impact assessment (SIA) of the affected households which include the loss of land, houses and other assets as well as the loss of source use or income/livelihoods in detail. DMS will be conducted by MOWRAM and Inter-Ministerial Resettlement Committee (IRC). MOWRAM has sent a request with layout and key features of the Barrage and Main Canal to IRC for the DMS. Social impact assessment and updating of inventory of losses for the Barrage and Main Canal were undertaken by the Project Implementation Consultant (PIC) in June 2016. The final DMS and SIA will be used to update and implement the final RP for the Barrage and Main Canal before the contract award for civil works of the respective components.

Out of the total disbursed US\$ 1,153,607.25 by ADB, US\$ 173,255.00 is available balance.

The IEE/EMP and Land Acquisition and Resettlement Plan for other components (secondary and tertiary canals) will then be updated after the completion of Detailed Design and the DMS and SIA.

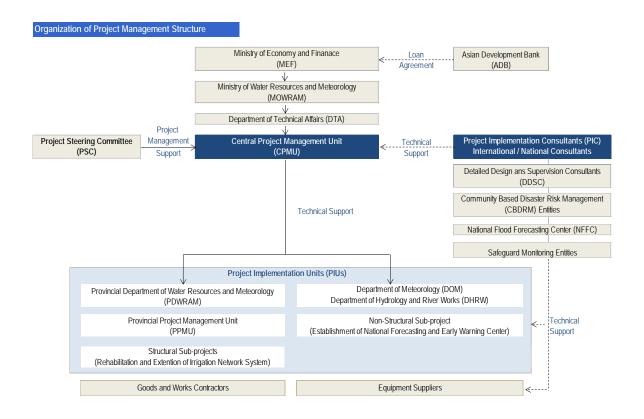

#### D. National Competitive Bidding

## A. Regulation and Reference Documents

- 1. The procedures to be followed for national competitive bidding shall be those set forth for the "National Competitive Bidding" method in the Government's Procurement Manual issued under Sub-Decree Number 74 ANKR.BK, updated version dated 22 May 2012 with the clarifications and modifications described in the following paragraphs. These clarifications and modifications are required for compliance with the provisions of the Procurement Guidelines.
- 2. For the procurement of ADB financed contracts under National Competitive Bidding (NCB) procedures, the use of harmonized national bidding documents (NCB and National Shopping) developed in consultation with development partners including ADB, is mandatory except where the Government and ADB have agreed to amendments to any part of the documents. The Procurement Manual also advises users to check the ADB website from time to time for any update on ADB documents, which form the basis, among others, of the

existing harmonized national bidding documents.

#### **B. Procurement Procedures**

## 1. Application

3. Contract packages subject to National Competitive Bidding procedures will be those identified as such in the project Procurement Plan. Any change to the mode of procurement of any procurement package in the Procurement Plan shall be made through updating of the Procurement Plan, and only with prior approval of ADB.

## 2. Sanctioning

4. Bidders shall not be declared ineligible or prohibited from bidding on the basis of barring procedures or sanction lists, except individuals and firms sanctioned by ADB, without prior approval of ADB.

## 3. Rejection of all Bids and Rebidding

5. The Borrower shall not reject all bids and solicit new bids without ADB'sprior concurrence. Even when only one or a few bids is/are submitted, the bidding process may still be considered valid if the bid was satisfactorily advertised and prices are reasonable in comparison to market values.

#### 4. Advertising

6. Bidding of NCB contracts shall be advertised on the ADB website via the posting of the Procurement Plan. Borrowers have the option of requesting ADB to post specific notices in the ADB website.

## C. Bidding Documents

#### 5. Use of Bidding Documents

7. The Standard National Competitive Bidding Documents provided with the Government's Procurement Manual shall be used to the extent possible both for the master bidding documents and the contract-specific bidding documents. The English language version of the procurement documents shall be submitted for ADB review and approval in accordance with agreed review procedures (post and prior review) as indicated in the Procurement Plan. The ADB-approved procurement documents will then be used as a model for all procurement financed by ADB for the project.

## 6. Bid Evaluation

- 8. Bidders shall not be eliminated from detailed evaluation on the basis of minor, non-substantial deviations.
- 9. A bidder shall not be required, as a condition for award of contract, to undertake obligations not specified in the bidding documents or otherwise to modify the bid as originally submitted.

## 7. Employer's Right to Accept or Reject Any or All Bids

10. The decision of the Employer to accept or reject any or all bids shall be made in a transparent manner and involve an obligation to inform of the grounds for the decision through the bid evaluation report.

## 8. ADB Policy Clauses

- 11. A provision shall be included in all NCB works and goods contracts financed by ADB requiring suppliers and contractors to permit ADB to inspect their accounts and records and other documents relating to the bid submission and the performance of the contract, and to have them audited by auditors appointed by ADB.
- 12. A provision shall be included in all bidding documents for NCB works and goods contracts financed by ADB stating that the Borrower shall reject a proposal for award if it determines that the bidder recommended for award has, directly or through an agent, engaged in corrupt, fraudulent, collusive, or coercive practices in competing for the contract in question.
- 13. A provision shall be included in all bidding documents for NCB works and goods contracts financed by ADB stating that ADB will declare a firm or individual ineligible, either indefinitely or for a stated period, to be awarded a contract financed by ADB, if it at any time determines that the firm or individual has, directly or through an agent, engaged in corrupt, fraudulent, collusive, coercive or obstructive practices or any integrity violation in competing for, or in executing, ADB-financed contract.
